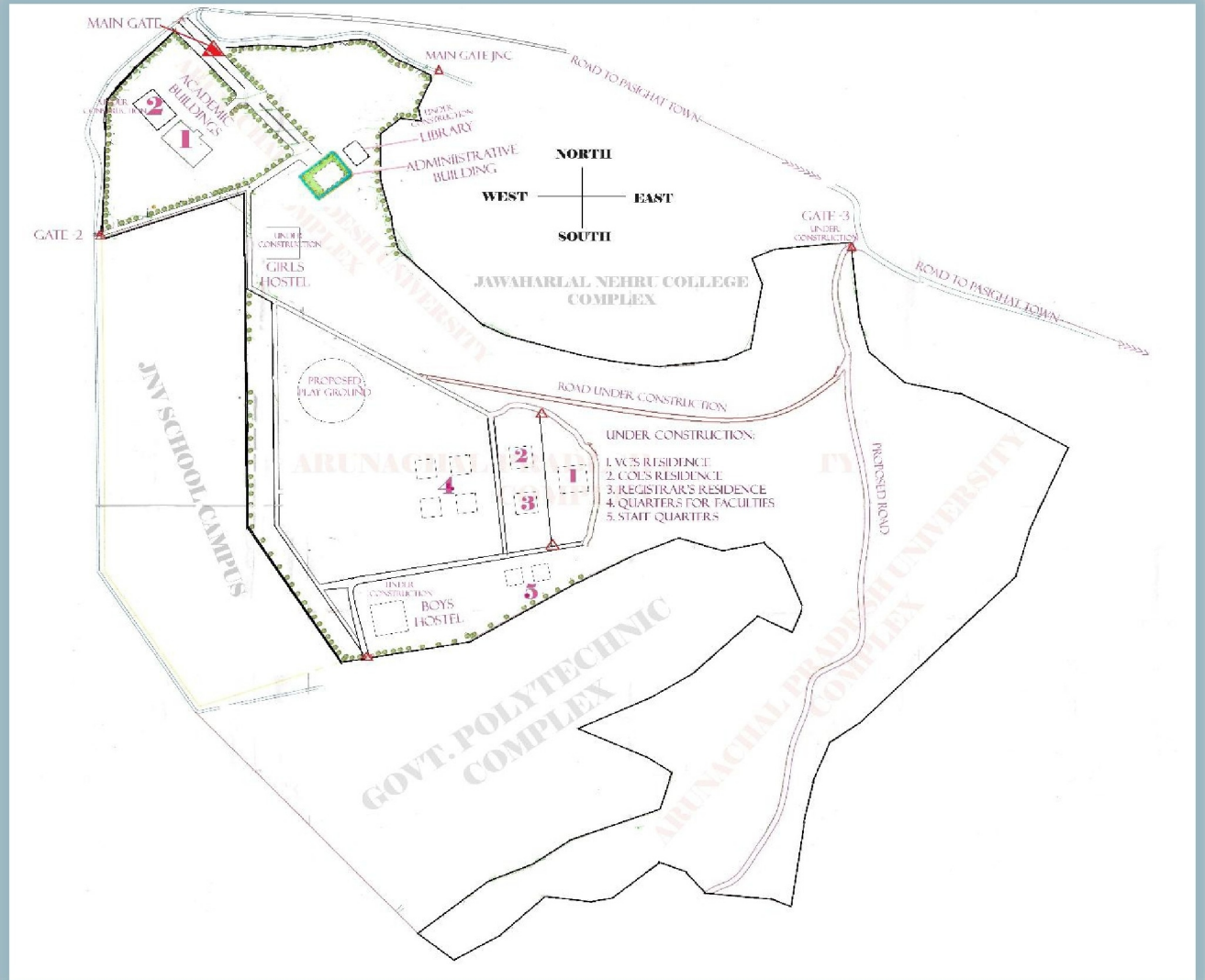

Introduction:

The Arunachal Pradesh University, located in Pasighat is the lone State University of Arunachal Pradesh, which was established on 1st July 2022 under the Arunachal Pradesh University Act, 2012 (Act 5 of 2012) passed by the State Legislative Assembly of Arunachal Pradesh vide notification No. LAW/LEGN-13/2012, dated 16 April 2012.

The University is recognised under Section 2(f) of the UGC Act, 1956 by UGC vide its recognition letter F.No.9-11/2022 (CPP-I/PU), dated 21 July 2022 and is empowered to award degrees by the UGC as specified under Section 22 of the UGC Act, 1956, by conducting courses through its own departments, its constituent colleges, and/or through the affiliated colleges in regular mode with the approval of the concern Statutory Bodies and Statutory Councils, wherever it is required.

The University operates within the territorial jurisdiction of Arunachal Pradesh and is empowered to give affiliation to Higher Education Institutions (HEIs) in Arunachal Pradesh as per the Arunachal Pradesh University Act, 2012. Arunachal Pradesh University offers a postgraduate and doctoral programme across various disciplines, including commerce and social sciences.

The Objectives:

The objective of the University shall be to disseminate and advance knowledge by providing instructional and research facilities in such branches of learning as it may deem fit, and endeavour through research, education, training and extension to play a positive role in the socio-economic and cultural development of Arunachal Pradesh and in particular the objectives set up in the first Schedule of the University Act. The logo of the University carries the Sanskrit verse, “*Gyanam Paramam Balam*” meaning “*Knowledge is the Supreme Power*”. Towards this, it shall undertake:

- i. To strengthen and diversify certificate and diploma courses related to the needs of employment, and building the economy of the region on the basis of its natural resources;
- ii. To introduce relevant undergraduate courses for enhancing knowledge and skills;
- iii. To provide education and training in the various arts, crafts and skills of the region raising their quality, and improving their availability to the people;
- iv. To provide or arrange training of teachers required for such activities or institutions;
- v. To provide training and other facilities to equip persons for different categories of jobs;
- vi. To provide suitable Postgraduate courses of study;

- vii. To undertake and organise research to develop the creative potential of its people, optimal use of the resources of the territory particularly that which is related to regional development; and
- viii. To provide counselling, guidance, and facilities for helping in the placement of students.

In furtherance of the fulfilment of the above objectives and activities, the University shall function in close collaboration with the State Government and concerned institutions in the State and the country.

The above Motto, Vision, Mission, and Objectives of Arunachal Pradesh University have been prepared in tune with the Arunachal Pradesh University Act, 2012 and was approved in the First Executive Council Meeting held on 23 May 2023.

Location:

The Arunachal Pradesh University, Pasighat is located at 28° 08' N latitude and 95° 30' E longitude, on the right bank of the Siang River (Brahmaputra), Pasighat, East Siang District, Arunachal Pradesh. APU shares its boundary wall with the Jawaharlal Nehru College, the oldest college of the state, established in the year 1964, on Hill Top.

The University is well connected with all-weather roads from East, West, North, and South directions. One can reach Pasighat from Dibrugarh by the Dola-Sadiya Bridge (Bhupen Hazarika Setu), the longest bridge in India via Roing from the East, Aalo in the North, Jonai district of Assam in the South, and Basar in the West. Pasighat - the oldest city of the state is well connected to Guwahati, the capital of Assam, and Itanagar, the capital city of Arunachal Pradesh through National Highway 515. It is connected to Dibrugarh by Bogibeel Bridge over Brahmaputra via Silapathar. Within the city, there is an airport that connects Donyi-Polo Airport in Itanagar, and Lokpriya Gopinath Bordoloi International Airport in Guwahati. The nearest railway station is at Murkong Seleik, just 40 kms from Pasighat.

Pasighat is often considered as the best-connected city in the state of Arunachal Pradesh and has been declared as one of the Smart Cities of the state. Pasighat is also known as the rice bowl of Arunachal Pradesh and is famous for organic fruits and vegetable farming. Pasighat is also a tourist hub and a city of educational institutions due to its ideal location and the exceptional hospitality of the people of Pasighat. There are many hotels and inns at relatively low prices. The thick evergreen forest and the presence of the mighty Brahmaputra River, adds to the beauty of Pasighat.

Academic Departments:

Arunachal Pradesh University in Pasighat hosts a range of postgraduate departments that cater to diverse academic interests and professional aspirations. These departments are designed to provide advanced education, promote research, and foster innovation across various fields.

Postgraduate programmes are regulated by and designed according to the “**National Education Policy 2020**” of the Ministry of Education, Government of India, “Curriculum and Credit Framework for Postgraduate Programmes”, “National Higher Education Qualifications Framework”, and “Guidelines for Multiple Entry and Exit in Academic Programmes offered in Higher Education Institutions” of the University Grants Commission.

Outline

There will be flexibility in the postgraduate programmes offered by the University, *viz.*:

1. Two-Year master’s degree course for those who completed a three-year bachelor’s degree;
2. There will be an exit option after completion of one year, i.e., two consecutive semesters, in a two-year programme as a Postgraduate Diploma in a concerned discipline;
3. One-Year master’s degree course for those who obtained a four-year bachelor’s with honours/research.
4. There will also be provisions for integrated five-year bachelor’s/master’s programmes depending on the capability of the academic department(s).

Note: - Students who have Back Papers and are Late Collegiate, following Choice-Based Credit System (CBCS) i.e. those who took their first semester admission in the year 2023 should refer to the University Prospectus of the session 2024-25.

Department of Commerce

3. **Module-III:** A comprehensive coursework-focused track, ideal for students aiming to build strong conceptual understanding without a major research component.
4. **Core Subjects:** The curriculum includes key areas such as Education in India with a special focus on the Northeast region, Comparative Education, Philosophical and Sociological Foundations of Education, and Research Methodology. These subjects are designed to provide a holistic understanding of educational systems, theories, and practices in diverse contexts.

Mode of Evaluation:

1. **Internal Assessment (IA):** Each paper carries 20 marks allocated for continuous internal evaluation, which may include assignments, presentations, class participation, and periodic tests to ensure consistent academic engagement.
2. **Term-End Examination (TE):** A comprehensive written examination of 75 marks per paper is conducted at the end of each semester to assess students' theoretical understanding and conceptual clarity.
3. **Attendance (5 Marks):** Attendance is an integral component of evaluation and is awarded as follows:
 - 95% or above: 5 Marks
 - 90%–94%: 4 Marks
 - 85%–89%: 3 Marks
 - 80%–84%: 2 Marks
 - 75%–79%: 1 Mark
4. **Dissertation:** The Dissertation is a vital component of the academic programme in the Department of Education, designed to cultivate advanced research aptitude, critical inquiry, and scholarly writing skills among students. Department of English

Preamble:

The NEP 2020, with its objective of giving a new shape and dimension to the existing educational scenario in the country by incorporating indigenous, national and international features, paints a vibrant vision for higher education. With a focus on reducing the number of dropouts, and increasing employability and diverse skills, the NEP 2020 envisions a curriculum that is conducive to all types of learners. Thus, taking into account the various requirements, and the need for interdisciplinary learning, the Faculty Board of Studies of English, Dept of English

has designed the present Post Graduate Programme in English to meet the set objectives as mentioned in the NEP 2020.

English Studies is taking on an increasingly important role against the backdrop of the current global scenario. With the rise of Artificial Intelligence and a shift towards dependence on it, the ever-important questions of humanity, creativity, and critical enquiry have been brought to the forefront once again. Thus, the Post Graduate programme in English, 2025, has been designed with the aim to provide the students with both hard and soft skills to negotiate the ever-changing environment around them. While Literary studies will continue to function as the core component of the syllabus, it also includes the mandate of the National Education Policy 2020, advocating increasing vocationalisation of curricula and, accordingly, several skill-based courses have been designed to lend the learners a competitive edge when it comes to selection for employment and further research positions.

Introduction:

The Post Graduate Programme in English syllabus offers a plethora of intensive courses with Major and Research components. In keeping with the NEP 2020 mandate for encouraging interdisciplinary learning, the courses have been designed taking into account the relevance of several other fields to English Studies. The facility for choosing from various models and the option of an early exit after two semesters will provide the students with the necessary space to align their learning experiences.

The core elements of English Literary Studies have been retained over the first two semesters, in order to ensure that the learners acquire a comprehensive knowledge of the socio-political, aesthetic, historical and literary dimensions of literature from across the world. This has been augmented by the introduction of courses on literary theory and criticism, and other courses leaning on interdisciplinarity, to encourage the learners to critically engage with literary studies, and other aesthetic and social discourse around them. The introduction of research elements in two of the three models provided to the students offers an opportunity to put their learned skills to practice, and to contribute to knowledge production and critical discourse in their respective field of studies, and the larger society beyond that.

Programme Educational Objectives (PEOs):

The objectives of the M.A. in English Programme are as follows:

PEO-1: To develop a deeper and wider understanding of literatures in English and other languages from around the world

PEO-2: To develop literary sensibilities and different aesthetic forms in the study of literature

PEO-3: To equip the students with a broad understanding of critical social and aesthetic theory and their application to the analysis of literature

PEO-4: To facilitate the development of necessary creative, analytic, and technical skills in the students to equip them for a career in diverse fields related to language, literature, culture, and beyond.

Programme Outcomes (POs):

In keeping with the objectives of the course, the following are the areas in which the students will equip themselves:

PO1: Foundational Knowledge

They will develop a good grasp on the foundational knowledge of literature from around the world, with a focus on the technicalities of literary forms and sensibilities, alongside an understanding of Indian literature and its various forms and contexts.

PO2: Critical Thinking

They will be able to develop critical thinking abilities and have a broad understanding of the prior works of important thinkers.

PO3: Analytical Skills

They will have developed skills to analyse literary and cultural texts, and see the associations of these texts with their everyday reality.

PO4: Employability

The students will be equipped with the skills necessary for a career in academics and other related fields.

Programme Specific Outcomes (PSOs):

PSO 1: The students will develop an understanding of the major literary and cultural texts and their contexts.

PSO 2: The students will be able to develop critical thinking and analytical abilities to deconstruct literary texts.

In addition to classroom teaching, the department actively organizes seminars, workshops, literary events, talks and extension activities to enhance students' academic exposure and research skills. It encourages participation in co-curricular and community-oriented programmes, thereby nurturing socially aware and culturally grounded individuals. With a focus on academic thoroughness and cultural sensitivity, the Department of Hindi aspires to produce skilled scholars, effective communicators and responsible citizens who can contribute meaningfully to academia and society.

About the Course

The Master of Arts (M.A.) in Mass Communication & Journalism is an advanced postgraduate program designed to provide students with a deep understanding of media history, communication laws, and professional production techniques. The course offers a systematic study of communication models, editorial management, and the socio-economic impact of media on society. The program balances academic study with practical skill-building, ensuring that classroom learning is reinforced through field-based training and hands-on projects. The curriculum is structured to produce versatile professionals capable of working across Print, Broadcast, and Digital platforms, with a specific focus on Development Communication as a catalyst for social change.

Eligibility

To be eligible for admission, an applicant must hold a Bachelor's degree in any discipline from a UGC-recognized university with a minimum aggregate of 40% marks (or equivalent CGPA). (Relaxation for SC/ST/OBC candidates as per University and State Government norms).

No. of Seats, Semester and Time Duration

- **Intake Capacity:** At present, the department has an intake capacity of 20 students; however, this number is subject to revision as per the decisions of the University and State Government policies.
- **Time Duration:** The program is a full-time course of two academic years.
- **Semester Structure:** The program is divided into four semesters, following the Learning Outcome-based Curriculum Framework (LOCF).
- **Exit Option:** In accordance with the National Education Policy (NEP) 2020, students have the option to exit after successful completion of the first year (two semesters). Such students will be awarded a Postgraduate Diploma in Mass Communication & Journalism.

Department of Tribal Studies

The Department of Tribal Studies focuses on the rich cultural heritage, history, and socio-economic aspects of various tribal communities. Mode of Selection:

There shall be dual mode of selection for admission in various PG Programmes. Candidates seeking admission to M.A/M.Sc/M.C.A/MSW/MCOM shall apply through CUET PG conducted by NTA or through Arunachal Pradesh University Common Entrance Test (APUCET) held in the month of July. As per decision taken by the Academic Council of the University, 20% of Seats shall be reserved for admission through CUET PG and 80% shall be filled through APUCET*. The candidates seeking admission through CUET PG mode may apply through submission of necessary form as given in the University website.

The candidates seeking admission through University entrance shall apply through University website. The APUCET is a two-stage written process comprising of the 1st stage Written Test and the 2nd stage Personal Interview. All the eligible candidates are required to

appear for the written test. A shortlisting of candidates for personal interview shall be done based on the result of the written test. The maximum no. of candidates shortlisted for personal interview shall be in the ratio of 3:1 of the total number of available seats in each department. There may be another stage of Group Discussion for programmes such as M.A. in Social Work (MSW) and M.A. in Mass Communication for selected candidates. The eligibility for admission shall be solely based on the merit in the APUCET.

Reservation:

The reservation shall be as per the prevailing 80:20 Reservation Policy of the Government of Arunachal Pradesh (i.e., 80% for the APST Category and 20% for the Open Category). A merit list for the Open Category will be prepared based on the marks obtained by all qualified students in the entrance test.

Relaxation:

Special additional weightage, over and above the marks secured in the entrance test, shall be given to Sportspersons (5% for international, 3% for National, and 2% for Regional), NSS Volunteers (3% for participation of 120 hours and above), and NCC Cadets (3% for attaining 'C' Certificate and 2% for attaining 'B' Certificate).

 - e. Sports/NSS/NCC Certificate, if any
 - f. College Leaving Certificate

- g. Migration certificate for registration (Before examination)
 - h. Receipt of admission fees deposited (to be submitted after admission)
 - i. Two passport-size photos (to be used in the admission form and identity card)
 - j. Academic Bank of Credits (ABC) ID card
- ii. The Overall Merit List, Selection List, and Waiting List shall be posted on the University Notice Board and University website www.apupsg.ac.in.
 - iii. Students awaiting their results shall also be eligible to apply. However, they shall have to produce the mark sheet/degree certificate on or before the last date of admission, failing which any provisional selection shall stand cancelled.
 - iv. A student, who has not been registered before the First End Semester Examination, shall be provisionally allowed to sit in the End Semester Examination; but the result of such students shall be kept withheld till he/she is registered. No such withheld result shall be declared after completion of 45 days from the date of notification of the Semester result.
 - v. **Admission granted shall be cancelled at any time** if it is found that the information furnished by the student is false or incorrect, or if, at a later stage, it is found that the student does not fulfil the eligibility criteria prescribed for the programme.

Verification of Students' Academic and Personal Testimonials:

- i. No department shall insist upon a student to submit the original academic and personal certificates and testimonials, except the College Leaving Certificate and Migration Certificate, at the time of submitting the admission form.
- ii. In line with instructions issued by the Ministry of Personnel, Public Grievances & Pension, Department of Administrative Reforms, PG & Pension, the University shall allow self-attestation of documents such as marksheets, birth certificates, etc. by the applicant as a system of verification of the original certificates and testimonials at any stage before the finalisation of the process of admission.
- iii. The department shall physically verify the originals at the time of admission of the student in his/her presence and return them immediately after satisfying themselves about their authenticity and veracity, keeping the attested copies for their record.
- iv. The self-attested testimonials of students shall be held valid and authentic by the University for all purposes and administrative requirements. There shall be physical verification at any time

during the course. Such verification shall be undertaken in the presence of the student and certificates and testimonials thus verified in original shall be returned immediately to the student.

- v. Taking the certificates and testimonials into institutional custody under any circumstances or pretexts shall be strictly prohibited to avoid misuse for blackmailing students who wish to withdraw admission from the department for better prospects or other compulsions.
- vi. In case of any suspicion over the authenticity or genuineness of the testimonials, the reference shall be made to the University or the Board which issued certificate(s) to the student and the admission be subjected to the authentication, but original certificates shall not be retained under any circumstances.

Remittance and Refund of Fees:

- i. The University shall charge fees in advance only for the semester/year in which a student is to engage in academic activities; not for the entire Programme, so that it does not become an impediment to the student's inter institutional mobility.
- ii. If a student wants to withdraw admission, the process of refund of fees shall be as follows:

(1)	100%	15 days or more before the formally notified last date of admission.
(2)	90%	Less than 15 days before the formally notified last date of admission.
(3)	80%	15 days or less after the formally notified last date of admission.
(4)	50%	30 days or less, but more than 15 days after formally notified of the last date of admission.
(5)	0%	More than 30 days after being formally notified last date of admission.
<i>*Inclusive of Programme fees and non-tuition fees but exclusive of caution money and security deposit.</i>		

- iii. Fees shall be refunded by the University to an eligible student within fifteen days from the date of receiving a written application from him/her in this regard.

Eligibility for Admission to Examinations:

- i. There shall be at least 180 teaching days along with 40 days for Admissions, Examinations, and preparation for Examinations in each academic year (for 5 working days per week).
- ii. To be eligible for appearing in the End Semester Examination, a student must have a minimum of 75% of attendance. Monthly attendance shall be displayed on the notice board of every department. A copy of monthly attendance shall be sent to the office of the Vice Chancellor for reference.
- iii. Attending two Internal Assessments is a must. The average mark of the two best Internal Assessments shall be the qualifying mark for admission to the examination. Failure in the Internal Assessment will lead to disqualification from admission to the examination.

If a student fails to obtain the stipulated attendance (75%), he/she shall apply through the Head of the Department to the concerned Dean for consideration of shortage in attendance with genuine reasons. Judging the genuineness of the case, the concerned Dean shall grant relaxation in attendance to the tune of a maximum of 5% and the Vice Chancellor shall condone another 5% of attendance, on the recommendation of the concerned Dean.

Examination & Evaluation (NEP)

Scheme of Continuous Internal/External Evaluation (NEP)

All credit courses are evaluated for 100 marks. Internal Assessment component is for 25 marks of which internal assessment is 20 marks and marks of attendance is 05 marks. The end semester University examination is for 75 marks. In case of Practicals, project works, etc. it is 50:50 marks for Internal and End Semester Exams.

Incentive marks for attendance

As approved in the First Academic Council meeting held on 11/04/2025, there shall be grant of incentive marks for attendance at the end of the semester. NEP encourages such practice and is practiced to reward students having good attendance. However, it is to note that such incentive

marks would be nullified in case of a student securing maximum marks. The following incentive marking shall be granted at the end of the semester for students having attendance: -

1. 95% or more - 5 marks
2. 90% to 94% - 4 marks
3. 85% to 89% - 3 marks
4. 80% to 84% - 2 marks
5. 75% to 79% - 1 mark

Continuous Evaluation and Internal Assessment:

- i. All the students shall be subjected to the process of continuous evaluation and assessment. Accordingly, a student shall have to attend and duly pass in at least two Internal Assessment Tests out of three tests, and End Semester Examination. The structure of these Internal Assessment Tests and End-Semester Examinations shall be 20:80.
- ii. To calculate the Semester Grade Point Average (SGPA), the best two of the three Internal Assessment Tests shall be taken. Attending two Internal Assessment Tests out of three is compulsory.
- iii. The following shall be applicable:
 - a. One of the Internal Assessment Tests shall be in the form of an assignment with a PowerPoint Presentation.
 - b. Internal Assessment Tests for all practical papers shall always be of a practical nature.

In case of exigencies and emergencies such as pandemics, natural disasters, etc., the above criteria for conducting Internal Assessment Tests shall be modified by the Head of the Department with due approval from the concerned/competent authority.

The Minimum Pass Mark/Back Paper and Improvement:

The minimum pass mark in internal assessment, practical, and the End Semester Examination shall be 40% in each paper and 45% in aggregate. The inability to secure the minimum prescribed pass mark in a practical paper/component will result in the student failing that paper.

- i. The marks from the Internal Assessment Test, once submitted, shall be considered final. No supplementary/modification of marks will be accepted after the declaration of the results.
- ii. A student who fails the First Semester Examination shall be out of the programme.

- iii. A student shall not be promoted to the next semester unless he or she passes at least 45% of the total papers in an End-Semester Examination. He or she shall be eligible to take the back-paper examination for the failed papers in the subsequent relevant semester examination(s).
- iv. The question papers of the End Semester Examination shall be of 75 marks to be attempted within a duration of three hours.
- v. The **maximum number of allotted semesters** to complete the PG Programme and clear the course for the award of the degree shall be 8 semesters (4 years).
- vi. The University shall issue a consolidated marks sheet after a student has passed the course showing the Semester Grade Point Average (SGPA) and latest Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA) status of the student.
- vii. A student seeking to improve his/her result shall do so by duly applying for the same on payment of the prescribed fee in the next relevant semester examination and this improvement chance shall be availed only once in a course paper to the condition that the result of such an **improvement examination** and back paper shall not be counted towards award of rank and medal.
 - a. A student shall be allowed to seek 'improvement' in not more than two papers per semester provided he/she has secured a passing grade in all the papers that appeared, in the corresponding End-Semester Examination, but is not satisfied with his/her score.
 - b. The student shall not however be required to join the relevant semester for attending classes and to appear in all the internal assessments/practical tests in the concerned paper(s).
- viii. In order to **repeat a paper(s)**, in case of back paper(s), a student shall apply to the office of the CoE through HoD; and if permitted to appear, shall be required to pay the prescribed fee within the stipulated period before commencement of the examination.
- ix. Towards ensuring confidentiality, answer scripts of the End Semester Examinations shall be coded prior to handing them over to the evaluators.
- x. **The End-Semester Practical Examination(s)** shall be conducted by an examination board comprising an External and two Internal Examiners appointed by the Vice Chancellor from a panel of examiners (6 internal and 3 external) recommended by the Head of the Department.
- xi. A candidate who has **failed the 1st Semester Examination shall be out of the programme.** However, such candidates can re-appear in the subsequent 1st Semester End Examination in all

papers as Late candidate. The chance to re-appear in such cases will be limited to one single chance/time.

- xii. All other matters related to assessment, attendance, examination, etc. shall be governed by the ordinances of the University.

Letter Grades and Grade Points Computation for Semester Grade Point Average (SGPA) and Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA):

Under the absolute grading system adopted by the University, the marks shall be converted to grades based on pre-determined class intervals. The grading system with the following letter grades shall be adopted in awarding the grades and CGPA under the credit-based semester system.

- i. For non-credit courses ‘Satisfactory’ or ‘Unsatisfactory’ shall be indicated instead of the letter grade and this shall not be counted for the computation of SGPA/CGPA.
- ii. The University shall decide on the grade or percentage of marks required to pass in a course and also the CGPA required to qualify for a degree taking into consideration the recommendations of the SRAs such as UGC, AICTE, MCI, BCI, NCTE, etc.
- iii. **Computation of SGPA and CGPA:** The computation of the Semester Grade Point Average (SGPA) and Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA) shall be done as follows:

- a. The SGPA is the ratio of the sum of the product of the number of credits with the grade points scored by a student in all the courses taken by a student and the sum of the number of credits in all the courses undergone by a student, i.e., $SGPA (S_i) = \frac{\sum(C_i \times G_i)}{\sum C_i}$; where C_i is the number of credits of the i th course and G_i is the grade point scored by the student in the i th course.
- b. The CGPA is also calculated in the same manner taking into account all the courses undergone by a student over all the semesters of a Programme i.e., $CGPA = \frac{\sum(C_i \times S_i)}{\sum C_i}$; where S_i is the SGPA of the i th semester and C_i is the total number of credits in that semester.
- c. The SGPA and CGPA shall be rounded off to 2 decimal points and reported in the transcripts.
- d. Transcript (Format): The Format for Transcripts shall be:

- e. The formula of conversion from Grade Point to Percentage of Marks shall be: **Percentage of Marks = Grade Point X 9.50**. Each Mark foil shall mention the formula of conversion from Grade Point to Percentage of Marks; Table of Interval of % of Marks, Letter Grades and Grade Points, on its front page.
- f. Rank holders and **Gold Medallists**, as per the criterion developed by the competent authority, shall be decided from the list of examinees who clear all the semesters in the first attempt.

Medium of Instruction in the Examinations:

English shall be the medium of instruction and examination in the study programme of the University. However, teaching and examination in Language and Literature Course shall be in their respective language(s).

General Rules for Admission to the Examinations:

- i. Applications for admission to examinations shall be accompanied by a duly signed admission form by the Competent Authority with the following documents with prescribed fees:
 - a. A certificate to the effect that the student is eligible to appear in the examinations under the Ordinance/Regulations prescribed for the examination concerned.
 - b. The application for admission to the examination shall be accompanied by two copies of the student's latest photograph indicating his/her name and a self-attested copy of mark sheets of previous examination(s). The photograph in the admission form shall be authenticated by the Head of the Department.
- ii. Any student who has submitted his/her examination form, beyond the prescribed date as notified by the University for filling up of forms, shall **pay a late fee** along with the prescribed examination fees as notified from time to time, till the third day after the last date of such notification.
- iii. To calculate the late fee, the date of remittance of money by the student from the Bank/online deposit shall be taken as the date of receipt thereof by the University.
- iv. **Repeaters and students opting for improvement** in any papers, as per rules, shall fill in the examination form along with the regular students on dates notified in the prospectus or fixed by the University from time to time.
- v. **Cancellation of Admission/Examination:** The University shall cancel the Admission to Examination of a student if it is found that he/she is not eligible to appear in the examination but has obtained admission through misrepresentation, concealment, or a misstatement of facts.
- vi. The marks obtained by a student in Practical Courses/Dissertation/Internal Assessment in a semester shall be **carried over as such** in case he/she clears the examination partially. There shall be **no provision for improvement in Practical Courses/Dissertation/Internal Assessment Tests**. However, students failing to qualify in practical examinations in the fourth

semester shall be allowed to appear in subsequent End Semester Examination to clear the backlog.

- vii. A student who fails to appear for an examination or appears in an examination provisionally and is subsequently declared ineligible according to rules and regulations shall **not be entitled to a refund of fees once paid** to the University.
- viii. Similarly, a student shall not be entitled to a refund of the examination fees paid to the University:
 - a. If permission accorded to him to take an examination is subsequently cancelled as a result of misstatement of facts or suppression of facts or for want of relevant information in examination admission form; and
 - b. If he/she tries to obtain admission to an examination by making a false statement/Concealment of facts in his admission form.

Disqualification from Appearing in Examinations:

- i. The Academic Council shall exclude any student from an examination permanently or for a specific period for reasons to be recorded if it is satisfied that such student is not a fit and proper person to be admitted to the examination.
- ii. If a student after admission to an examination commits an immoral act or is discovered to have committed an immoral act, the academic council shall:
 - a. Cancel his/her candidature for that examination and order that his result be not declared;
 - b. Disqualify him/her permanently or for a specific period.
- iii. If a student, subsequent to the issue of Roll No. or after the appearance in an examination, is found to be ineligible to take the examination, his/her candidature shall be cancelled by the Controller of Examinations.
- iv. If a student, before issue of Roll No. or before appearance in an examination, is found to be ineligible to the examination his/her candidature shall be cancelled by the Controller of Examinations.
- v. A student seeking admission to a course/examination who:
 - a. Has been disqualified by this University or any other University/Board, shall not be eligible to appear in any University examination during the period of disqualification; and
 - b. Wilfully suppressed to disclose information pertaining to a previous disqualification incurred by him/her shall be disqualified for another period of two years.

Special Arrangements for Sick Examinees:

If a student falls ill or is suffering from a contagious disease, special arrangements shall be made by the Coordinator/Superintendent at the request of the student, subject to the production of

evidence/duly certified by the Medical Superintendent/Head of a Government Hospital/University Hospital, provided that for such special arrangement(s), the student shall pay an additional fee per paper fixed by the University from time to time.

Special Arrangement for Amanuensis (Writer/Scribe):

- i. A student shall be allowed the help of an amanuensis (writer/scribe) if he/she is:
 - a. Permanently blind or disabled from writing with his own hands, or
 - b. Blinded by an accident before the examination, or
 - c. Temporarily disabled from writing, on account of fracture of the arms, forearms or dislocation of the shoulders or wrists, etc.The student shall produce a certificate from the Chief Medical Officer/District Medical Officer of the district concerned to the effect that the student is unable to write his or her answer book because of the temporary disablement, or production of disability card issued by the Govt. of India.
- ii. The Controller of Examinations shall arrange for an amanuensis and inform the Coordinator/Superintendent of the centre concerned.
- iii. The amanuensis shall be a person having a lower level of education (at least 1 year) than the student.
- iv. The Superintendent shall arrange a suitable room for the disabled student and appoint an invigilator for him/her. The invigilator shall be changed every examination day.
- v. The student without a permanent disability shall pay the applicable fees for hiring the amanuensis (Writer/Scribe).
- vi. A student for whom an amanuensis has been engaged shall be given half an hour of extra time.

Restriction on Two Regular Programmes:

No student shall be permitted to pursue two regular programmes simultaneously in one academic year till the regular course is completed and issued an Institution Leaving Certificate.

Registration and Renewal of Registration:

The registration of the student(s) to University for all programmes shall be completed within 45 days from the last date of admission.

If a student fails to complete his/her course within the maximum specified duration; OR rejoins a course after a gap of three years from his/her last examination from this University, shall have to renew the registration on payment of fee, as notified by the University from time to time.

Punishment for Unlawful Acts During Examinations:

Punishment for Unlawful Acts during Examination shall be as per the Examination Ordinance of the Arunachal Pradesh University.

Ph.D. Programmes

The Arunachal Pradesh University offers Ph.D. programmes in various disciplines. The University shall advertise PhD admission notification in advance on its website and through advertisement in at least one (1) local/state newspaper specifying the number of seats for admission, subject/discipline-wise distribution of available seats, criteria for admission, the procedure for admission, and all other relevant information for the candidates.

The Issue and submission of application for admission to the various Ph.D. programmes will be through online mode. The candidates seeking admission need to visit the university website www.apupsg.ac.in.

Some Important points for Ph.D. admissions

- Candidates seeking admission to the PhD programme listed above must have a Master's degree in the relevant subject with a minimum of 55% marks (50% for SC/ST/OBC/PwD candidates) or its equivalent grade in the UGC 10-point scale. For Tribal Studies, candidates must have a Master's degree in any social science discipline with a minimum of 55% marks (50% for SC/ST/OBC/PwD candidates) or its equivalent grade in the UGC 10-point scale.
- **Ph.D. in Education:** Applicants must hold a Master's degree in Education (M.A. Education/M.Ed.) with the minimum (55%) percentage or grade as stipulated by the University Grants Commission (UGC) and the respective university norms, along with meeting any additional criteria such as entrance tests or interviews as required. (Relaxation of marks in admission for different reserved categories as per the state govt.'s norms)
- The University will conduct Arunachal Pradesh University Ph.D. Entrance Test (APUPET). It will be conducted through a 2-stage process, i.e. Written Entrance Test and Viva-voce. The Entrance Test syllabus shall consist of 50% of research methodology, and

50% shall be subject-specific. Students who have secured 50% marks in the entrance test are eligible to be called for the interview.

- A relaxation of 05% marks will be allowed in the entrance examination for the candidates belonging to SC/ST/OBC/Differently-Abled Category, Economically Weaker Section (EWS), and other categories of candidates as per the decision of the UGC from time to time.
- Based on the UGC Public Notice No.F.4-1(UGC-NET Review Committee)/2024 (NET)/140648 dated 27.03.2024; Applicants who have qualified UGC-NET examinations post June 2024 are exempted from the Written Test of APUPET-2025 and can be called for Viva-voce.
- Those students who have cleared NET prior to 2024 will have to appear for APUPET-2025 Written Test.
- The University may decide the number of eligible students to be called for an interview based on the number of Ph.D. seats available.
- The dates to the Ph.D. entrances, admission and other such information has been tentatively provided in the academic calendar given in the early section of this brochure. The dates may subject to change and in that case, it will be notified in the university website www.apupsg.ac.in
